## No tuition hike in '87 OU budget

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved a 1987-1988 general fund budget request of \$55.2 million, nearly a 10 percent increase (\$5.4 million) from the 1987-1988 fis-

(§5.4 million) from the 1987-1938 (is-al year.

The increase was approved by the trustees last week for submission to Gov. James Blanchard.

The economic portion of the re-quested increase totals \$3.27 million for salary and wage adjustments, general inflation and nonpersonnel costs.

No tuttlon increase was included. The Rochester-based university's fis-cal year begins next Oct. 1.

THE BOARD will ask state approval for baccalaurente programs in theater, health behavioral science and industrial relations. But the programs do not require start-up funding.

The 1967-1988 budget request includes a \$35 million state appropriation during the OU fiscal year and \$17.9 million in tuition and fees as the two major sources of revenue. The budget request does not assume a tuition increase for 1987-1988.

# Science building top OU priority

A new science building and an animal care facility head the list of 1887-1988 capital outlay requests approved by the Oakland University Board of Trustees for submission to the other.

Board of Trustees for submission to OU is asking \$250,000 for programming costs toward a \$28 million science building. OU would provide \$3 million of that cost with \$25 million to come from the saking for an initial \$25000 toward a \$500,000 animal care facility.

THE UNIVERSITY has emphasized the need for the 200,000-grossquare-foot science building.

President Joseph Champagne said it is needed to allevlate growing shortages of laboratory, classroom, office and special facilities space in the science and engineering areas.

The shortage is made more critical by the continued accelerated development of the university's technical programs with corresponding high enrollment in those areas.

Out trustees upproved a 225,000 request toward the new library building on which ground will be broken next spring.

They aske continues special maintenance cost of \$50,000 to replace PCB transformers on the campus.


