## CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 8:07 p.m. on October 6, 1988, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

**PRESENT:** Campbell, Hartsock, Richardson, Tupper, Yoder.

**OTHERS PRESENT:** City Manager Deamian, Director Billing, Deputy Director Goss, City Clerk Bushey.

Minutes of the previous meetings were approved as written. Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council approved a temporary sign for Crossroads by Clement, 22094 Farmington Road for a thirty day period.

Council granted a fence variance to Bradley Lawton, 34005 Oakland for a fence section attached to the east and west side of his garage and denied his request for a variance for the portion of fence located along Wilmarth Street.

Council granted no variance to Albert Herring for a second ground sign at 23280 Farmington Road.

Council granted permission to Dorman's, Inc., to conduct an outside sale of pumpkins from October 15 to October 31, 1988, and stated this could be an annual event.

Council authorized the sponsorship of a Girls State candidate in the amount of \$160.00.

A review of the Senior Citizen Cab Program was submitted to Council by Special Services Director Potter.

Council introduced Ordinance No. C-538-88 which would establish a 30-year franchise for Consumers Power Company.

Council authorized closing the two City Parks and Raphael Street daily from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. from October 29 through November 1, 1988.

Council authorized the issuance of a Change Order to Italia Construction Company, Inc., for replacement of curbs on Grand River at \$18.00 per linear foot.

Council approved payment of \$39,079.92 to Detroit Concrete Products for work completed on Alta Loma Street.

Council authorized final payment of \$20,817.96 to Armstrong Lawn and Tree, Inc., to be completed on the Shawnessy Park Improvement Project.

Council approved the purchase of 2,800 linear feet of fire hose from West Shore Services at \$10,274.00.

Council accepted the low bid of \$3,193.00 from Johnson Smith Graphics for printing the 1987 Annual Report.

Council authorized the Mayor and the City Clerk to execute an Easement Agreement on the Old Town Drain Outlet.

Public comments were heard.

The following ordinance was adopted:

## ORDINANCE NO. C-537-88

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON BY ADDING NEW SECTIONS, WHICH NEW SECTIONS SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTIONS 8-22, CHILD RESTRAINT SYSTEMS AND SECTIONS 8-23, SAFETY BELTS, EXCEPTIONS, REQUIREMENTS, OF CHAPTER 105, TRAFFIC, TITLE X OF SAID CODE.**

## THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

- 8-22 Child Restraint System**
- (1) Except as provided in this section, or as otherwise provided by law, each driver transporting a child in a motor vehicle shall properly secure each child in a child restraint system as follows:
- (a) Any child less than 1 year of age in a child restraint system which meets the standards prescribed in 49 Code of Federal Register 571.213.
- (b) Any child 1 year of age or more but less than 4 years of age, when transported in the rear seat, in a child restraint system which meets the standards prescribed in 49 Code of Federal Register 571.213.
- (c) Any child 1 year of age or more but less than 4 years of age, when transported in the rear seat, in a child restraint system which meets the standards prescribed in 49 Code of Federal Register 571.213, unless the child is secured by a safety belt provided in the motor vehicle.
- (2) This section does not apply to a non-resident driver transporting a child in this state or to any child being nursed.
- (3) This section does not apply if the motor vehicle being driven is a bus, school bus, taxicab, motorcycle, or other motor vehicle not required to be equipped with safety belts under State or Federal law.
- (4) A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.
- (5) Points shall not be assessed under this section.
- (6) The secretary of state, exempt by rules promulgated pursuant to Act No. 358 of the Public Acts of 1987, as amended, a class of children from the requirements of this section, if the secretary of state determines that the use of the child restraint system required under subsection (1) is impractical because of physical infirmity, a medical problem or body size. The secretary of state may specify alternate means for protection for children exempted under this subsection.
- 8-23 Safety Belts; Exceptions; Requirements**
- (1) This section shall not apply to a driver or passenger at:
- (a) A motor vehicle manufactured before January 1, 1985.
- (b) A bus.
- (c) A motorcycle.
- (d) A motor vehicle if the driver or passenger possesses a written verification from a physician that the driver or passenger is unable to wear a safety belt for physical or medical reasons.
- (e) A motor vehicle which is not required to be equipped with safety belts under federal laws.
- (f) A commercial or United States postal service vehicle which makes frequent stops for the purpose of pickup or delivery of goods or services.
- (g) A motor vehicle operated by a rural carrier of the United States postal service while serving his or her rural postal route.
- (2) This section shall not apply to a passenger of a school bus.
- (3) Each driver and front seat passenger of a motor vehicle operated on a street or highway in this state shall wear a properly adjusted and fastened safety belt, except that a child less than 4 years of age shall be transported as required in Section 8-22. Each driver of a motor vehicle transporting a child 4 years of age or more but less than 16 years of age in the front seat of the motor vehicle shall secure the child in a properly adjusted and fastened safety belt.
- (4) Enforcement of this section shall be accomplished only as a secondary action when a driver of a motor vehicle has been detained for a suspected violation of another section of this act.
- (5) A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.
- (6) Points shall not be assessed for a violation of this ordinance.
- (7) This section shall not apply after April 1, 1989, if, on that date or any time thereafter, the United States government requires the installation of positive passenger restraints in new automobiles, whether that requirement is by statute, administrative rule, court decision, or in any other way.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on September 15, 1988, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on October 6, 1988, and will become effective ten (10) days after publication.
