
New Peking restaurant offers delightful dishes

Performances of Shake-speare's "Richard III" continue through Sunday, Nov. 2, at Mead-ow Brook Theatre on the Oakland University campus in Rochester Hills. For ticket information call the box office at 377-3300.

Meadow Brook's innovative production of "Richard III" verges on melodrama. The hunchbacked king was as malicious, arrogant, and deceitful a character as ever walked the stage, and Shakespeare's artful but immature play about him almost makes an audience want to hiss and box.
