OCC faculty learning 'Teaching Thinking'

It was a new kind of retraining for Oakland Community College fac-

It had nothing to do with new com-puter programs, new inventions or discoveries.

discoveries.

It was called training in "Teaching Thinking." Instructors in math, English, psychology, engineering technology and nursing went through it together, said CCC academic Vice President Richard Thompson.

MUCH TEACHING involves "regurgitation" — memorizing segmented answers and spitting them back on command, said Johanna Kobran, academic dean of OCC's Auburn Hills Campus

bran, academic dean of OCC's Au-burn Hills Campus. "Society, via television, en-courages people to think limitedly and to respond with short, impulsive

and to respond with short, impulsave maswers.

"We need to encourage students to think doliberately, to deline problems, identify officetive strategies for solving problems, develop flexible thinking, do collaborative learning, acknowledge and use feedback, restrict inspulsaveour go teachers to the same. We need to teach students to learn how to learn."

AND SO, OCC, which is heavily in-

AND SO, OCC, which is heavily involved in teaching older students and industrial retarioling, found itself going back to the basics of thinking.

The 14 OCC faculty members were brought together for most of a week at the end of summer. Another training session for a new batch is planned for November, Kobran said.

"We hired a team of instructors from Oakhand University," she said. "They have been trained in, and have field-tested, the materials from Reuven Feuerstein on Instrumental Enrichment."

Enrichment." What's "instrumental enrich-

ment"?

"A series of exercises which aid students in developing thinking techniques," she said. Exercises are pre-



sity who developed a series of exer-cises in thinking, Kobran said. His-central idea is that intelligence, far from being engraved in grantic, is like a soft plastic that can be shaped

like a soft plastic that can be shaped atmost at will.

Take the first Feuerstein exercise. It involves a series of boxes, each with 10 dots.

"Each box has dots which can be connected to make a square and two triangles. You begin to connect the dots and expect to make hypotheses about subsequent boxes," she said. Some people just "see" the triangle and squares. That's not enough.

The crucial question, she said, is "how do you know that?"
"It's not just reciting certain facts, but to relate those facts into a hypothesis," Kobran said.

"PEOPLE GET revivalistic about it," she said. "It's exciting to see people who have taught for 20 or 30 years come in to do something different."

One OCC faculty member has in-corporated Feuerstein exercises into an English course. Another is using a series of them in a math course.
Will it make a difference to stu-

dents?
"We'll look to see if students in those classes have a better, the same or a worse grasp of their material as those who didn't," Kobran said.

OCC WILL offer faculty members OCC WILL offer faculty members a second "Teaching Thinking" semi-nar in November. Fifteen have signed up.

After that, "Teaching Thinking" will be offered as long as instructors are interested, she said.

"It" one of many things for instructional growth and enrichment," Kovan said.
