Instead he would prefer to paint he was picture of what he saw in the two war region. Low'vie, a wember of the Trinity Church of the Brethren in Redford Township, went there on a goodwill trip, with Wilness for Peace. It's a group concerned with the current situation in Central America.

"It's not Americans they don't like. It's not Americans they don't eare for," he said.

LUDWICK WANTED to find out first-hand the political and social climate in a country where the leftist Sandinista government is flighting the United States-backed Contras.

And he caught more than an eyeful.

ful.

He witnessed poverty with people living in wooden shacks and children playing in the mud.

He watched an anti-U.S. demonstration where a mannequin of President Reagan was burned in the town

square.
Ludwick spoke with families who've been ravaged by the conflict, with family members believed to be kidnapped and killed by the contras.



"I NEVER saw the effects of war before," sald Ludwick, 28, of Detroit. "I've never seen so many people un-der the pressure of war."

Nicaragua is an uncomfortable
place to be for a U.S. citizen.

Ludwick said he did not detect any
tostility towards him.

In fact he even had an animated
conversation with a youth who was
involved in the political demonstration against the United State.

"He wanted to know what it was

like here," Ludwick said. "... Even though they tie (the conflict) with the United States, they showed no onimosity towards me. Which is what Ludwick wanted to achieve on his visit there. His main task was to show that not everyone in the United States wants to cause upheaval in Nicaragua.

HE ALSO MET with the members of Catholle Church hierarchy in Managua and the banned newspaper, La Prenza, which opposes the San-

La Prenza, which opposes the Sandinista government.

The people in the street, he said, provided their own view of the situation. They told him they are appalled by the U.S. intervention.

Ludwick had ample opportunity to sample general public opinion. For a week, he stayed with a Baptist minister 25 miles from from the Honduran border where the conflict is most intense.

most intense.
"A lot of the parishoners have had

problems with the contras," he said.
"One had her sons kidnapped and
killed. One had her sister kidnapped
and haven't seen her since."

and haven't seen her since."

QUILALI, THE town he stayed in, was attacked three weeks ago by the contras.

Ludwick also spent some time at a resettlement camp, which later was the soene of a mortar attack. Four children were killed and 34 people were injured in the attack.

The experience, he said, hasn't made him a supporter of the Sandinistas. If anything, however, it has turned him more against the contras.

More than anything, though, he supports the end to the conflict. The problems, he believes, aren't as easy to solve as some people might think.

"A lot of people think it's a simple situation (communism versus democracy)," he said. "It's more complicated than that."


