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bers and guests a long list of Tupper's accomplishments, Tuttle referred to the award winners as one of those "who best represents the ideals of the two cities (Farmington and Farmington Hills)."

Bob Van Every of H.A. Smith Lumber, who nominated Tupper, confirmed Tuttle's sentiments. "I couldn't think of anyone who has done more," he said.

Also honored at the annual membership meeting was outgoing chamber president John Handley, special marketing projects manager for Jervis Webb Co. of Farmington Hills, and incoming president Nancy Finley, senior vice president for Michigan National Bank of Farmington.

Keynote speaker Don Canham, University of Michigan director of athletics, discussed intercollegiate athletics — the pressure put on young athletes to compete on the major college level and whether athletes are exploited.

When Tupper first arrived in Farmington in 1936, there was a lot to be done. But Tupper wasn't aware of that until he began visiting building sites in the city and noticed that some things weren't quite as they

should be.

"Come to find out, we had no building code in Farmington," Tupper said. "I could see no regulations for building. So I went around to other communities, got copies of their codes and built up Farmington's."

THAT was only the first of many contributions for the city that Tupper has come to love. Even though he and his wife, Margaret, have traveled to 22 countries, "none of them would take us out of Farmington. Farmington is certainly a beautiful place to live in."

From the start of his residency in Farmington, Tupper got involved. He was a charter member and chairman of the Farmington Planning Commission and Farmington Board of Appeals. While serving on those commissions, he also sat on the Farmington Board of Education for 10 years, six as president.

He also served on the Farmington City Council for three years as well as the Farmington Board of Review. During World War II, he organized Farmington's first civil defense unit. Ten years after moving to Farm-

ington, Tupper helped found the Smith-Tupper Lumber Co., now H.A. Smith Lumber. In 1959, he sold out and formed Tupper Lumber and Associates, now called Tupper Association, which supplies materials to builders. And you'll still find him at work most days.

While involved in the local community, Tupper still found time to be equally involved in his profession. He served as president of the American Sub Contractors Association of Michigan and is a former member of the Detroit Lumberman's Association.

TODAY, TUPPER is president of the Wynset Condominium Association and congregation president of the Salem United Church of Christ, Farmington.

In his spare time, Tupper helps make toys for children in Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor, bakes for residents of area nursing and convalescent homes and provides transportation to senior citizens.

"It's always been very exciting and well worth the time spent," Tupper said about his years of community involvement.

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Surplus commodity food will be given out from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday, in St. Alexander's Church, 27835 Shawwassee, Farmington Hills.

The food, distributed through the Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency, includes cheese, butter and dry milk. It will be made available every other month.

Eligible Oakland County residents should bring the following information to register for the 1986-87 Surplus Commodity Food Program year: Social Security card, proof of income for the past 90 days and personal identification. The program year runs from October 1986 to Sept. 1987.

PEOPLE WHO have received commodities in the past should return their old USDA Surplus commodity Food Registration Card at the time they register.

Seniors who regularly attend a senior center should contact that center for pickup dates and times. Homebound seniors should contact the senior center nearest their home to assure homebound delivery. Non-homebound seniors should call 624-5520.

Registration does not guarantee receipt of commodity food each time. Distribution is on a first-come, first-served basis.
