DOWNHILL SKIING — Registration is being accepted for both sessions of the downhill ski program. Children in grades 4-12 are eligible to enjoy skiing at Mount Brighton on Friday evenings in three sessions. Session I will begin on Jan. 9 and Session II on Jan. 30. Fee is \$38 per person per session and does not include ski rental. Buses will leave from designated sites at 4:30 p.m. and return approximately 10 p.m.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING OCTOBER 27, 1988

Mayor Alkateeb opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on October 27, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Alkateeb, Dolan, Dudley, Marks, Sever, Soronen and Wolf. Others present: City Manager Caslick, City Clerk Reynolds, Assistant City Manager Call, and City Attorney Bibeau. Video presentation was given on DPW Operations. Minutes of October 14, 1988 were approved as submitted. Council adopted Resolution of Intent regarding Industrial Facilities Examination Certificate for Joma Realty Enterprises at 4755, 24844 and 25000 Hagerly Road. Ordinance No. C-46-86 was enacted, amending Section 60.2307 regarding Political Signs and summary was approved for publication. Ordinance No. C-47-86 was enacted, amending Zoning Chapter 60, Section 60.1202, deleting "restaurants" in OS-3 Office District classification and summary was approved for publication. Zoning Text Amendment was introduced, adding paragraph g, to Section 60.102 regarding special conditions placed on secondary uses adjacent to residential districts, and changing paragraph A. (1) of Section 60.1302. Council adopted Resolution Consenting to the Transfer of Employment by G & L Tool, Inc., located at 20741 Sunvale, Farmington Hills, to a new facility in Westland, pursuant to Act 198 of Public Acts 1974. Council authorized extension and renewal of current refuse collection contract with The Rubbish Company, Inc. for a four year period from November 5, 1988 to November 5, 1992. Resolution was adopted, authorizing City staff to proceed with plans and preparation of mid-decade Census. Council approved site plan for expansion of Fire Station No. 3 and authorized construction bids for proposed addition. Final Plan for Rolling Oaks West No. 2 was approved (formerly known as Hunters Pointe North). Council authorized study of Banner "Flag" Program. Date December 3, 1988 at 7:30 p.m. was set for special study session at Fire Headquarters. Council authorized City Manager to issue purchase orders to: Morton for rock salt at \$17.71/ton delivered, based on 3,000 tons yearly for \$53,127. International for rock salt at \$21.32/ton delivered, to be used only if necessary. Levy for sand-chloride mixture at \$9.91/ton delivered, based on 800 tons yearly for \$7,128. Council adopted resolution to send to Oakland County Road Commission, with copies to County Commissioners, regarding inadequate left turn phases at Thirteen and Fourteen Mile and Orchard Lake Road intersections. Farmington Ridge Road system development was placed on agenda for November 10, 1988 meeting. Meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 8:05 p.m. on October 29, 1988, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan.

PRESENT: Campbell, Hartsock, Tupper, Yoder.

ABSENT: Richardson.

OTHERS PRESENT: Adm. Assistant Schultz, Director Billing, Deputy Director Goss, City Attorney Kelly, City Clerk Bushey.

Minutes of the previous meetings were approved as written.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council supported House Bill 4194 which would ban nonmetal firearms.

Council issued the following proclamations:

MEDICAL ASSISTANT'S WEEK November 3 - 7, 1988

WEIGHT WATCHERS WEEK November 10 - 17, 1988.

Council established a Public Hearing for 8:00 p.m. on November 17, 1988, on the vacation of Longwood Street and alley.

Council authorized the Mayor and the City Clerk to sign the right-of-way easement with Detroit Edison.

Council appropriated an amount not to exceed \$8,000.00 and authorized B & V Contracting to do the contract work of grading and surfacing for the storm water treatment facility.

Council authorized the transfer from the current Blue Cross/Blue Shield program to the Michigan Municipal League's Cluster program, effective January 1, 1987.

Council approved the expenditure of \$15,000.00 as the city's share of the Tri-Party Road Commission Program to resurface Ten Mile from Power Road east to Orchard Lake Road.

Council authorized payment of \$16,458.49 to Italia Construction Company for removal and replacement of sidewalk along the south side of Arundel Street.

Council adopted a resolution indicating intent to implement a 2-mill tax included in the Downtown Development Authority plan.

Council accepted the proposal of Michigan Municipal Bond Authority to issue tax anticipation notes and authorized the necessary actions to effect the sale.

Council approved two deferred special assessments recommended by the Committee to Review Deferred Payments of Special Assessments.

Council received the Building Department's First Quarter Report, July 1 thru September 30, 1988.

The following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE NO. C-538-86

CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, GRANTING TO CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE RIGHT, POWER AND AUTHORITY TO LAY, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE GAS MAINS, PIPES AND SERVICES ON, ACROSS AND UNDER THE HIGHWAYS, STREETS, ALLEYS, BRIDGES AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES, AND TO DO A LOCAL GAS BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, FOR A PERIOD OF THIRTY (30) YEARS.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. The City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby grants to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan for a period of 30 years.

SECTION 2. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of Grantee's pipes and mains shall be so placed in the highways and other public places as not to unnecessarily interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes.

SECTION 4. Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the City on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice received by the City, save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said City, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations.

SECTION 6. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 7. Said Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said City for gas furnished therein, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas rates and rules regulating such service in said City, are hereby granted for the term of this franchise. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefor being made by either said City, acting by its City Council, or by said Grantee.

SECTION 8. The franchise granted by this ordinance is subject to revocation upon sixty (60) days written notice by the party desiring such revocation.

SECTION 9. Said Grantee shall, as to all other conditions and elements of service not herein fixed, be and remain subject to the reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, applicable to gas service in said City.

SECTION 10. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after the date of publication thereof, provided however, it shall cease and be of no effect after thirty days from its adoption unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the City Clerk. Upon acceptance and publication hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said City and said Grantee.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on October 6, 1986, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the City Council on October 20, 1986.
