· Both Harrison coach John Both Harrison coach John Herrington and Riverview coach Don Lessner have in excess of 20 years of coaching experience, Both are among the movers and shakers of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association. We have a mu-tual admiration society here.

"John Herrington is an outstand-ing conch," said Lessner. "There isn't a finer gentleman or more of a class person than John. He is a super representative of high school athlet-ics."

Said Herrington: "We've worked together in the coaches' association for some 16 years. Don Lessner is a great football coach."

Harrison is a veteran of state tournament action, qualifying for the playoffs in three of the last five years. This is Riverview's first playoff appearance.

Harrison is 8-1 and champions of the Western Lakes Activities As-sociation. Riverview is also 8-1 and tri-champs of the Huron League with Grosse Ile and Monroe Jefferson.

• Harrison is a small, quick team. Hiverview is a bit bigger but not as quick.

• Harrison has a diversified of-fensive attack with special emphasis on the passing game. Riverview's de-fense is geared toward stopping the

Riverview's offense is built on a power running game. Harrison's defense has proved competent against both the run and pass, al-though North Farmington had suc-cess with a power game against the Hawks last week.
