Fingering control of splish-splashes

OU CAN'T enjoy winning unless you occasionally fail, and you can't enjoy an airbrarsh unless it occasionally backet with the control of the c

singing to yourself, "Strainger in Paradise."

But when it splis and clogs, quits and salves out a gush of paint all over, then you might change your tune to "What Kind of Food Am 1."

Here are some basic airbrush tips have learned over the past five years. Remember there are two ways to learn from the many some part of the past five years. Remember there are two ways to learn from the mistakes yourself, and the easy of others.

HYOU HAVE A single action airbrush, always be sure to check the stipple adjusting serow — often it works its way loose. Located under the linger button, its purposed is to restrict you from fully depressing the button which reduces the affressure.

pressure.

The loss in air pressure causes the paint to spray out in large and irregular dot patterns. When turned down

(so that it will not touch the finger button), you should have full air pressure, which is about 32 psl. If your spray still has large dot pat-terns, then your paint needs to be

terns, then your paint needs to be thinned. If you still have large dot patterns, then your tip is dirty and needs to be the your tip is dirty and you the your tip is dirty you should check the adjusting wheel (or serew) in front of the finger button. Often this has worked its way around a few times in handling and has forced the finger button back. This in turn allows paint to come out even when you are not pulling the

even when you are not pulling the button back.

This little wheel (or screw), however, can be your best friend. If you are trying to paint a small restricted area or a straight line and have a fear of pulling the button back too much, simply adjust for the line width with this adjustment am directly depress the button.

Another reason for getting paint without pulling the button back is a loosened compression nut. Check in-

With all the backward and for-ward motion, it is understandable that this nut could loosen just enough to allow the needle to back up, which, in turn, allows the flow of paint. To correct this, merely loosen the compression nut, then push the needle forward until is fits sunggly into the tip.

Another problem is the is an ill-fitting tip that does not seal properly

around the needle. This allows paint to seep out and form on the tlp. Then when you depress the button, you are surprised to see paint spitting off the tip of your nirbrush.

ARTFUL HINTS: For the best re-sults; alvays airbrush perpendicular to your retwork. This reduces over-spray and shows less of the tooth of the boarl.
