**Local Youth Hijacking  
Airliner Dies In Cuba**

The mixed-up, unhappy life  
of Henry Shorr, 18 has come to  
an end in Cuba.

Shorr, who hijacked a Pan  
American World Airways jet  
to Havana at gunpoint last  
October, died in Cuba where  
he has been ever since.

HE IS THE SON of Mr. and  
Mrs. Mickey Shorr of Franklin  
Knolls in Farmington.

The elder Shorr, a former  
Detroit disc jockey, refused  
comment on his son's death  
except to say he does not know

how or exactly where his son  
died.

A spokesman for the Ira  
Kaufman Chapel in Southfield,  
which is handling funeral ar-  
rangements, also refused any  
new details.

Working through the Swiss  
Embassy, the U.S. State De-  
partment is trying to obtain  
details and release of Shorr's  
body.

Extremely bright with an IQ  
which placed him in the top 15  
per cent of his class at North  
Farmington High, Shorr was a

"loner" in school and unpopu-  
lar because of his beliefs and  
his passion for political argu-  
ments.

He felt the war in Vietnam  
was wrong, he deplored "rac-  
ism" and declared wealthy  
capitalists like Henry Ford  
exploited the poor.

SHORR was involved in the  
March 1969 walkout of students  
at North Farmington High and  
was one of 198 students sus-  
pended, but he was not one of  
the incident's leaders.

North Farmington High stu-  
dent said at the time of the  
hijacking that Shorr did not  
really get involved in school  
issues, but termed him "the  
most radical kid in school, who  
always talked Cuba, Cuba,  
Cuba."

Why Cuba instead of another  
socialist country?

He felt Russia and China  
were too oppressive," said the  
student.

Shorr's beliefs got him into  
one fight at North Farmington.  
He attempted to force an un-  
derground paper on another  
student who retaliated by  
punching Shorr in the ear.

Shorr's parents pressed  
charges and a preliminary  
hearing was held. The boy paid  
Shorr's medical expenses  
which settled the dispute.

Questioned about Shorr at  
the time of the hijacking,  
North Farmington Principal  
Clayton Graham described the  
youth as a "Jekyll and Hyde"

because he was quiet until poli-  
tics was discussed.
