Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police and fire calls received during the past week.

● PLANT SEIZED

A 3-foot-tall suspected marijuana plant was seized from a downtown

Farmington apartment window after a passerby saw it and called police.

According to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report, officers executed a search warrant Nov. 3 and found the plant in the window of an apartment in the Cook

& Co. Building on Grand River.

A warrant will be sought charging the plant owner with violation of the controlled substance act, according to the public safety report.

● LEAF FIRES

Three leaf and grass fires, thought

to be started maliciously, were reported in Farmington Nov. 4-5, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

Two fires occurred at the same site of Anaswood. One was doused with a water hose, the other by public safety officers. A leaf fire on Ro-
