Oakland board OKs \$13.6 million jail bid

County Executive Daniel T. Mur-phy falled to talk the Oakland Coun-ty Board of Commissioners out of spending \$15 million on a new 244-

spending \$15 million on a new 244-bod jail.
"It was awkward — coming at the 11th hour," said Commissioner Raiph Nelson, R-Rochester, of Murphy's \$46. million, lower-security alternative.
"I'm very disappointed we've gotten to this point before this alternative was presented," said Commissioner Roy Rewold, R-Rochester.
That seemed to sum up the mood of even Murphy's Republican supporters in the Ilnance committee Thursday. That night the full board gave 24-0 approval to a \$13.6 million general contract to DeMaria Build-

ing Co. of Novi. The remainder of the cost will be for architect's fees. Construction is expected to take two years. Money will come from the county's 1987-91 capital im-provement budget.

JAIL ENPANSION is part of the price Oakhand must pay to satisfy a 1881 U.S. District Court concent judgment in a suit brought by prisoners who complained of overcrowding and inadequate facilities.

Already the state's second-largest county has spent \$8 million on plans, a pre-trial services program, legal fees for the Sheriff's Department, renovations to two buildines for wom-rowatens to two buildines for wom-

fees for the Sheriff's Department, re-novations to two buildings for wom-en, a new roof for the present 1972 jall and transporting excess prison-ers to the Washtenaw and Allegan crunt es jalls.

Murphy declined to say whether

he would veto the contract.
That appeared unlikely, given the board's virtually unanimous approval and commissioners' nervousness about wanting to satisfy the court judgment. It would take 18 votes to

MURPHY AND Shan Topiwalia, director of computer services, argued that the high level of security in a conventional jail isn't necessary for many prisoners.

"We have been studying the jail population and have found that 44 percent of the immates stay less than 24 hours in the jail," Marphy said.

"A large portion can be classified to be housed in the work release or trusty camp," he said, pointing to the non-dangerous 24 percent who are booked for drunk driving.

"A significant finding is that conclevably many don't need housing beyond the holding cell. Drunk driv-

ers are high in numbers but low in the numbers of beds required."
"On our worst day we need 136 ad-ditional beds," said Topiwalla, com-paring that to the 24 beds a new jail would provide. "The total system overcrowding on its worst day is be-tween 6 and 8 percent."

CENTRAL POINT of their case against the architect's \$13.6 million proposal is that the "at risk" opulation population is projected to decline 9 percent over the next 20 years. "The population is aging. There are fewer young, risky prisoners," said Topiwalla.

The executive suggested adding a second floor to the present jail, providing 192 additional cells at a cost \$7.5 million. A 200-bed addition to the trusty camp would cost \$1 mil-

"A large portion of this (main jail) group can be classified to be housed in the work releas or trusty camp," he said.

Setting aside the \$13.6 million new jail plan and adopting the \$8.5 million alternatives would save \$15 million, they concluded. "Operating costs of this alternative will be less than the current proposal because many of the service functions—kitchen, reading room, medical

room — will be shared," Topiwalla added.

SHERIFF JOHN Nichols fairly exploded at the idea of reclassifying prisoners for the trusty camp.

"Reclassifying and the prisoners for the trusty camp." Nichols said, alming a derisive barb at Topiwalla's job.
Commissioners of both parties gave a list of objections to the executive's plan:

• Republicans Anne Hobart and Richard kuhn, both of Waterford, said earlier studies showed it wasn't feasible to build a second floor. James Doyon, D-Madison Heights, said the state of the art in jail building had changed and likened a second floor to "putting a carrier deck on a battleship."




