OU capital drive aids library first

Oakland University "went public" als week with its first major fund-

this week with as the raising campaign.

The goal is to raise \$15 million in live years — \$10 million for plant and equipment and \$5 million for operations, President Joseph Cham-

pagne said.
"You need momentum. You try to
build up leadership," he said as he
announced that \$7.1 million already
had been raised. "You try to be at
one-third of your goal before you go

public.
"Then after your campaign, your total giving tends to sustain itself.
People give to things they've already given to.

"OUR FIRST priority is the library," Champagne said. A doubling of the Kresge Library's size will cost \$11.5 million.

Of the \$10 million in capital funds, \$45 million will go to the university's local share of the project. The state budget will kick in \$7 million.

"The only way we could get the state to tay tuy the money for the library was for us to put up," Champagne added. The Kresge Foundation aircady has given \$1 million to library project.

Groundbreaking will be in spring of 1987, and completion is scheduled for fail of 1988.

CHAIRMAN OF the fund-raising effort is Eugene A. Miller, president of Comerica Inc. it will be called "A Share in the Vision: The Campaign for Oakland University."

The effort was launched with a news conference Tuesday afternoon and the annual dinner of the OU President's Club, an organization of \$84\$ members who support the university and its programs, that evening.

"Without additional funds," said Miller, "facilities, equipment and programs will lag." He outlined three other goals:

• \$1.5 million to increase science and computer technology, This will provide equipment for students and faculty for teaching and research purpoces throughout the university,
• \$2 million for The University Fund to reflect donor interests in various activities of the university.
• \$4 million for The University Fund to reflect donor interests in various activities of the university.
• \$5 million for The Opportunity Fund that will support teaching, re-

search, public service and cultural
activities. These range from Meadow Brook cultural arts programs to
athletics, engineering and the
bumanities.
"EIGHTY PERCENT of Oakland's graduates settle in the imme

OU has about 25,000 graduates. "In a
typical, public, four-year university,

She said alumni have pledged \$1 million and given about \$310,000 to the campaign.

OU was begun in 1957 when the late Mattida R. and Alfred G. Wilson gave \$2 million and their 1,400-acre Meadow Brook Farms Estate to create it. OU opened in 1939 and was operated by Michigan State University until 1970, when Oakland obtained its independence.

This fall, Oakland University enrolled a record 12,707 students. Instructional budget is about \$50 million.

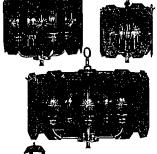
