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# 'Foxfire' spreads its warmth

meadow Brook Theatre's production of "Footfire" is rich with the down-home humor and country wisdom of the tough Appalachian folk who've farmed Georgia's Blue Ridge Mountains for generations.

It's a worthy play sustained by the warmth and wit of its characters. Arthur Beer's masterful portrayal of the crotchety ghoot, Hector Nations, glows with naturalness and shows what hill-country integrity is really about.
