

# Duthie resigns boys swim post

Pat Duthie is leaving the North Farmington boys swim program again. But this time the circumstances are quite different. Seven years ago, Duthie resigned in anger. He began the North program, made it a winner, then was rather unceremoniously bumped from his teaching job. He came back three years ago. Now, happy and contented, Duthie is stepping down again.

"I was kind of angry the last time I left," the successful swim coach said. "This time, that's not the case. I am really happy I had the opportunity to come back."

There are several factors that led to Duthie's resignation. No. 1, Duthie coaches both the boys and girls programs at North. That means he is in the pool nearly every day from August through mid-March. Also, there is a four-week overlap at the end of the girls season and the beginning of the boys season that is especially taxing. On top of that, Duthie is without an assistant coach.

"I just couldn't see how I could do both without an assistant," he said.

Duthie will continue to coach the

girls program at North. THE SECOND factor involves his family. Duthie wants to be able to spend more time with his kids. "There comes a time when you feel you have to be around more," Duthie said. "My daughter is a freshman in high school now. It won't be long before she is gone," he said.

Duthie will take over as a coach with a United States Swim Club of Michigan-sanctioned swim club in Novi. He'll coach swimmers of all ages, including his own kids.

"It's an excellent opportunity for me," he said. "I enjoy the younger kids a lot, and I am so much fun."

Duthie said he also plans on staying close to the North boys program. "This was a very hard decision for me to make. I'm not the type of person who likes to give up on something. I'll miss the kids, no question about it. But my intention is to stay with the girls program and support the boys as much as I can. Kind of like a volunteer assistant, whatever."

Duthie has coached the boys program at North for 15 years. He will be replaced by Louis Balogh.

"He's a young guy, very enthusiastic and seems to know swimming," Duthie said. "I'm sure he will do an excellent job."

North Farmington geared up for the Western Lakes league meet with a 103-65 victory Thursday night against Farmington.

For Farmington, Lauren Weary won both the 50 free (26.59) and 100 butterfly (1:01.40). Tonya Slicker won the diving with 164.10 points.

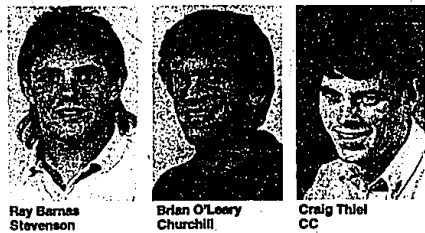

was voted all-Western Lakes and first team all-state. He was an all-Western Division pick a year ago. "I'm in the best set-up player I've ever had," said Churchill coach John Nell. "He had great touch and could feed the forwards extremely well and give them good shots."

Craig Thiel, forward, Catholic Central, teamed up with his younger brother, Brian, this senior forward was a threat anywhere near the goal.

He scored 15 goals and added 10 assists for the district-champion Shamrocks. His career totals are 29 goals and 14 assists.

Thiel, by his position, the co-captain should deft ball skills and field smarts, according to his coach, Paul Selcuna.

Brian O'Leary, midfielder, Livonia Churchill, a three-year team member and two-year starter, the senior halfback was a tough competitor who used his height and ball skills to his advantage.

This season, O'Leary scored three goals and added five assists en route to second team all-state and all-Western Lakes honors.

He was excellent at controlling the ball and moving it up to his forwards," said coach Nell. "He is a superb defensive halfback."

Mel Karfis, midfielder, Livonia Stevenson: A junior, Karfis took most of the Spartans' throw-ins, free kicks and corner kicks this season.

He scored five goals and added 10 assists in 1986, raising his career totals to 12 goals and 20 assists.

A two-year starter and three-year letter winner, Karfis was voted second team all-state and all-Western Lakes.

Zac Belm, midfielder, North Farmington: The Raiders' captain, Belm, a senior, recorded 15 assists this season to set a school record. He also scored five goals in 1986.

Coach Cathy Cole said of the three-year starter and two-time all-Western Lakes choice: "Zac reads the game extremely well and has the vision and skills to direct and finish the play. He is one of the finest passers and playmakers in our area."

Mike Zaretti, defender, Plymouth Salem: The senior co-captain was one of

Rich Hutchman, midfielder, Livonia Churchill: A senior, Hutchman controlled the midfield area against some of the state's best teams.

"Rich is just one of the finest people I've been associated with as a coach," said Franklin's Doug Marks.

Phil Neumaier, defender, Livonia Churchill: Playing center-halfback, the senior was the Chargers' field general.

"Phil was excellent at using his other halfback and controlling the field," said his coach, John Nell. "Very seldom was he caught out of position. His ball skills were excellent and he was very aggressive."

A three-year player and two-year starter, Neumaier was voted all-Western Lakes.

Derek Willford, defender, Livonia Stevenson: Only a sophomore, Willford led a defensive unit that allowed only 17 goals and recorded 12 shutouts.

According to coach Pete Scent, Willford led the team in minutes, rarely coming off the field.

The rewarding season led to Willford being named to the all-Western Lakes Division team. He is also a member of the under-15 Michigan state select team.

Tom Goodwin, defender, Catholic Central: The 6-foot-4 senior made his presence known around area soccer fields.

As a center-halfback, Goodwin's job normally was to shadow the opposing team's top scorer.

An all-Catholic League pick, Goodwin finished a fine career with 11 goals and eight assists.

"Tom dominates in the air," said CC coach Paul Selcuna. "He is a very smart passer with good skills."

Mayor Alkateer opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on November 10, 1986 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Alkateer, Dolan, Dudley, Sever, Soronen and Wolf. Mayor accepted request of Farmington Area Jaycees to participate in Christmas tree lighting ceremony at Warner Mansion Gazebo, Sunday, December 7, 1986.

Minutes of October 20, 1986 were approved as amended and minutes of October 27, 1986 were approved as submitted.

Council adopted EDC Resolution No. 4, approving project plan for Botzford P.O.B. Associates Limited Partnership project.

Council accepted request of Tokyo Oriental Health Spa to change hearing date on Special Space Ordinance was referred back to staff for resubmission within 30 days.

#### NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION BY CITY COUNCIL AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF A CONTRACT PLEDGING THE FULL FAITH AND CREDIT AND TAXING POWER TO THE CITY AND NOTICE OF RIGHT TO PETITION FOR REFERENDUM UPON THE AGREEMENT.

TO ALL ELECTORS AND TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS AND OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that on November 10, 1986, the City Council for the City of Farmington Hills adopted a resolution approving and authorizing the execution and delivery with the COUNTY OF OAKLAND, acting pursuant to the provisions of Act 342, Public Acts of Michigan, 1931, as amended, of a Contract relative to the acquisition, construction and financing of the Evergreen and Farmington Sewage Disposal Systems, Pollution Control Facilities, Southfield and Farmington Hills, by the COUNTY OF OAKLAND to serve the City of Farmington Hills, part of the cost of which will be paid by the City pursuant to a pledge of its full faith and credit.

**PURPOSE OF CONTRACT**

The Contract has for its purpose and provides for the acquisition and construction of the Evergreen and Farmington Sewage Disposal Systems, Pollution Control Facilities, Southfield and Farmington Hills, consisting of pollution control facilities at a total estimated cost of \$44,450,000 and for the issuance of bonds by the County of Oakland to defray the City's part of the cost of acquiring and constructing the facilities after application to said total cost of the proceeds of Federal and State grants, if any become available. The bonds to be issued will be primarily secured by the obligation of the two cities of to pay the principal and interest on the bonds when due.

**CITY CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATION**

The bonds to be issued by the County of Oakland will bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 18% per annum and will mature serially over a period not exceeding 40 years. The full faith and credit of each City has been pledged in the Contract for the making of payments to the County in amounts sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds as the same shall become due and for the payment of bond service charges incurred by the County. Taxes levied by each City for the payment of its obligations to the County will be subject to applicable statutory and constitutional tax limitations.

**RIGHT TO PETITION FOR REFERENDUM ON AGREEMENT**

This notice is given by order of the City Council and in order for the benefit of the electors and taxpayers of the City of Farmington Hills and any other interested persons in order to inform them of their right to petition for a referendum upon the Contract. The Contract will not become effective until the expiration of 45 days after the publication of this notice. If, within said 45 day period, a petition signed by 10% or 10,000, whichever is the lesser, of the registered electors residing within the City which is filed with the City Clerk requesting a referendum upon the Contract, the Contract will not become effective until approved by a majority of the electors of the City qualified to vote and voting thereon at a general or special election.

Further information relative to the subject matter of the Contract and this notice, including the description and location of the improvements, may be secured at the office of the City Clerk where a copy of the Contract is available for examination during normal business hours.
