Hills men face cocaine delivery charges

Two men identified as Farmington Hills residents were among 12 Michigan residents indicted Friday on eccaine distribution charges in what one law enforcement officer called a "massive drug arrest."

The two are Arthur J. Smith, 37, identified by Robert Mott of the FBI office in Detroit as working in the healing and air conditioning field, and Barry S. Friedman, 28, identified by Mott as working in the elec-

trical field.

The indictments cracked a multi-million-dollar cocaine distribution ring that operated for a decade, said law enforcement officials.

Twenty-two people were indicted but only 10 arrests were made Friday. Seven of those arrested were from Michigan, including five from Southfield. Friedman was among tose arrested and arraigned Friday. Officials said attorneys for three

others named in the indictment, in-cluding Smith, had contacted author-ities and indicated their clients would turn themselves in.

Mott said the following Southfield sidents were named in the indict-

ment:

Donald K. Berry, 35;

Kenneth R. Citron, 36, identified by Mott as a psychologist;

Ernest L. Citron, 59, identified

MOTT SAID that all those named in the indictments were charged with four counts of conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute and conspiracy to distribute cocaine.

He said investigators are charging that those indicted were involved in a cocaine ring that operated for 10 years. Cocaine, he said, was brought into the country from Colombia to Florida and then transported to a distribution center in Southfield.

Mott said that as much as 100 pounds of cocalne valued at \$2.3 million was involved.

He said the indictments came af-

ter a three-year investigation involv-ing the FBI, the Michigan State Po-lice and the U.S. Customs Service.

Of those arrested Friday, seven were from Michigan, two from Florida and one from New York.

All the Southfield residents except for Cote and the Cohens were arrest-ed and arralgned Friday, as was Barry H. Schmideberg, 34, Birming-ham.
