

Falcons, North victorious on the mat

Your Board of Oakland County Road Commissioners and the Cities of Farmington and Farmington Hills invite your comments on the proposed project to reconstruct and widen Orchard Lake Road beginning at Grand River Avenue in the City of Farmington and ending at Eleven Mile Road in the City of Farmington Hills.

We invite all interested citizens to attend and express their views or request information on this matter before the completion of final construction plans for this project.

Date: December 15, 1988, Time: 3:00 P.M.-6:30 P.M.
