Familiar downtown figure dies

Muriel Bird — whose short, bespectled, white-haired presence was as much a part of downtown Farmington as the Sanders or the A&P stores she frequented — died Tuesday in Braeburn Nursing Home, Bloomtled Hills.

She was 92.

During the 12 years she lived in Farmington, she made the acqualatance of many who worked and shopped regularly in the city's downtown area. It was almost from the start, a mutual love affair. "I loved Farmington, period. I really did," she said when she left the area to live closer to her daughter.

Morse on Jan. 31, 1894, in her par-ents' farmhouse in Fairfield Town-ship, four miles north of the Michi-gan-Ohlo border. Mrs. Bird was proud of the fact that her family set-tided in Michigan in 1835 – two years before the territory became a state.

MRS. BIRD attended classes in a MRS. BIRD attended classes in a one-room schooliusus before moving on to Adrian High School and Adrian College. In 1916, she graduated from Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Oblo. Music and language were her chief interests.

She married Evert Bird, a Michigan Employment Securities Commission employee, Oct. 10, 1921. That year, they moved to Detroit.

They lived there and traveled extensively before moving to Farmington in 1972. Two years later, Mr. Bird died after suffering a stroke. He spent his last two years in Oak Hill Nursing Home, Farmington.

Survivors include one daughter, Martha Scrase, of Bloomfield Hills; two grandchildren, Dr. David Scrase of Ann Arbor and Julie Scrase Menassaka of Grand Blanc; and four great-grandchildren.

Services will be held at 11:30 a.m. Friday in Thayer-Rock Funeral Home, Farmington, Burlal will be in Woodlawn Cemetery, Detroit.


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
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
