According to both Kirkland and two school officials, Kirkland issued an ultimatum to the administration. He wanted both a raise in pay and an adjustment in the school's security policy to allow his runners some additional hall space to run in during the winter months. If those requests weren't met, he would resign.

KIRKLAND WAS angry that first-year swim coach Paul Schroeder was given a starting salary of \$1,500. Kirkland was paid \$1,600 to coach cross country and another \$1,200 to coach track and filed.
