
The board is directed to evaluate a special option to cover community colleges.

Students may elect to attend private colleges. They will be repaid amounts equal to the weighted aver-

age tuition of all four-year public colleges.

Two investment plans will be provided. The ingre expensive one will cover tuition at any of the 15 state college; and universities. The lower cost option will pay up to 10 percent of the weighted average — a provision thal currently would cover it colleges.


The MET board is given authority to make special provisions for graduate school, room and board.
