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


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Challenges abound

THE GAMES people play this holiday season will range from one that theoretically can award the winner a col-lege degree, to a sailing race board game for those intrigued by life on the bounding main,

And among the small packages San-ta may leave under the Christmas tree this year is a game its designer insists

is not a game.

Developed by the Hungarian who produced the mind-boggling "Rubik's Cube" a few years ago, this puzzle is called "Rubik's Magic." It is an eight-panelled rectangle, with each panel attached by a four-sided hinge.

On both sides are three unconnected rainbow-colored rings, each printed across several panels. The object of the puzzle is to link the rings. But the catch is that when any one panel is moved, the colored rings move as well.

ERNO RUBIK, 42, whose sold over 100 million copies worldwide, says his device is not a game - meant solely to entertain — but a puzzle, which enables the solver to discover and explore.

Too often people look, but they do not see," Rubik says. "Only when you pay attention can you find things you never noticed before. This puzzle helps you to see.

Rubik's "Cube" 43,252,003,274,489,856,000 (quintil-43,252,003,274,489,850,000 (quinti-lion) possible configurations. His "Magic" creation reportedly has even more - but only a single correct solu-

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Lighthouse calendar is available

"Lights of the Great Lakes" is the theme of the 1987 calendar of the Historical Society of Michigan.
