HASSON HANDLES an enormous amount of fine detail with great skill. His design abilities are formidable, from the placement of the elements and the embellishment of them to the depth and masses of color.

The sense of fulfillment and love of life that follows Hasson like an aura carries over into his work. He

has a set of photographs of himself and his studie in Juffa. He is sitting on a rooftop enjoying the view of the city and the hills beyond, relaxing on the front steps leading to his studio and working in his studio surrounded by paintings, plants and wonderful light from the windows and skylights.

Peleg said, "He has two great talents, one in painting and the other in the art of living and dealing with people. He makes people feel good when he is around them."

It was Leeer Peleg, 19, who met Hasson first. When he returned from Israel he told his mother about his artist/friend, but she didn't get excited until Hasson wrote to her and sent pictures of his work.

"The moment I saw the work, I called him and I called him every Sunday after that until he arrived here in November."


