

Prince of Peace's 'spiritual sons' are pulpit guests

During the holiday season, two "spiritual sons" of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church will address the congregation from the pulpit. A special reception, honoring the seminarians is being planned by the congregation after the worship services Sunday, Dec. 28.

"Mark Bowditch and Peter Marcell are spiritual sons because they are both members of our congregation and both are working toward careers in the ministry," said the Rev. T. Marcell, pastor of the church, on the corner of 12 Mile and New Market Road.

Bowditch, son of William and Audren Bowditch and a lifelong resident of Farmington Hills, will deliver his message to the congregation at 8:15 and 10:45 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 28. He is completing his final year at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind., having graduated from Concordia College, Ann Arbor. Prior to his enrollment at Concordia College, he attended North Farmington High School where he was active in the sports program. He also was affiliated with Fellowship for Christian Athletes, which took him to India and several cities in the U.S., giving him the opportunity to give witness to his faith through sports activities.

Bowditch was also deeply involved in Boy Scouts and attained the rank of Eagle. As a scout, he traveled extensively, assisting others to enroll in the award program. This spring he will receive his vicarage assignment, a program at the seminary that is comparable to internship in the medical field. For a period of one full year, a student is assigned to a congregation under the

supervision of a local pastor. During that time period, experience in the pastoral ministry is granted. He is married to Barbara Catti, a native of Hawaii. They will be observing their first anniversary this Christmas Eve.

PETER CHRISTIAN is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. T. Richard Marcell Sr. A native of Cleveland, Ohio, he is in his final year at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, the largest Protestant seminary in the U.S. He completed his vicarage assignment in August at Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, Cupertino, Calif. Prior to his enrollment at Concordia Seminary, he attended Concordia College, Ann Arbor, where he was active in student activities.

While in Ohio he attended Lutheran High School-West in Rocky River. Marcell is scheduled to be in the pulpit at Prince of Peace for the New Year's Eve Eucharistic Service at 7:30 p.m. Three years ago he was married to Carol Popke from St. Clair.

Both Marcell and Bowditch have been elected by their respective student bodies to head up the athletic activities at their seminaries. The two seminarians will be invited to assist the pastor in the two Christmas Eve candlelight worship services on Christmas Eve, slated for 7:30 p.m. and 11 p.m. The Senior Choir, under the direction of Charlotte Eberhardt, minister of music at Prince of Peace, will also contribute to the services, with Donald Hart as soloist.

Cedar Point to interview for 3,000 jobs

The winter holidays may seem like an unusual time to interview for a summer job, but it is the best time of the year to apply for a position with the Midwest's largest seasonal employer, Cedar Point, the Sandusky, Ohio, amusement-theme park.

Representatives from Cedar Point will be conducting interviews from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday through Tuesday Dec. 28-30. The interviews will be held in the Employees Visitor Center (EVC), the blue building located at the corner of First Street and the Cedar Point Causeway in Sandusky. Appointments are not necessary. Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.

According to Larry Higgins, personnel director at Cedar Point, the park is seeking "friendliness, energy and enthusiasm. Applicants must be looking for a challenging summer job with many rewards. Working at Cedar Point is a unique experience. Applicants must possess the desire to work hard at their job and at pleasing our guests," he said.

Approximately 3,000 positions will be available in more than 100 job classifications, including ride and food operations, merchandise, ground maintenance and accommo-

dations. Several positions, such as lifeguards, landscapers, craft demonstrators and cooks, require special skills. A complete list of job classifications is presented on the application. Auditions for performers for the park's live shows will be in January.

The base wage will be \$3.40 per hour, plus a 35-cent-per-hour bonus paid at the end of the season to eligible employees fulfilling their employment agreement. Lost-cost dormitory and apartment-style housing is available for employees who are at least 18 years old and live outside a 25-mile radius of the park.

"Many employers regard Cedar Point experience as an asset to an applicant's qualifications," said Higgins. "Our seasonal employees tend to develop good work habits that prove to be useful in future jobs."

Employee facilities include a modern recreation center, employee cafeteria, library, post office and a visitor's center. Free transportation to and from Sandusky Mall and downtown Sandusky is also provided. Cedar Point also hosts planned activities for the employees throughout the season. The park sponsors dances, weekly movies, boat trips to the

Lake Erie Islands and an extensive intramural program that includes basketball, good volleyball and the annual Beach Olympics.

"Working at Cedar Point provides a wonderful opportunity to meet people from all over the country. Last year we had employees representing 37 states," said Higgins. "Friendships made during the sum-

mer often last a lifetime."

Additional applications are available at the Cedar Point Personnel Office, although personal interviews greatly increase the chances for employment.

Next summer Cedar Point will be open daily from Saturday, May 9, through Labor Day, Sept. 7, plus two weekends in September.
