The Farmington catery has been selling more of their non-alcoholic beer, Kaliber, than ever, Dunleavy said.

"Three or four years ago, you couldn't get rid of a case every six months," he said. "Now it's become quite popular."
Dunleavy advertises the non-al-coholte mait brew with table signs and notices more men than women ordering the drink.
"The ladies tend to stick with the non-alcoholte drinks like Virgin Mary and Virgin Dadquiris," he said.
"The beer is more popular among the men."

The crackdown on drunk drivers and the added responsibility of li-quor-serving restaurant owners are reasons why, Dunleavy said, that non-alcoholic beverages are becom-

ing topsellers.
"Any good restaurant owner has been aware of problems (with serving drinks) and knows that you just can't keep serving drinks and let customers walk out of here drunk."
One solution is to not overserve patrons, a method Dunleavy adheres to stringently, "We do not over-serve. When I've thought customers have had enough to drink, I just tell them they've had enough, tost of the time, they say "Thank you' and leave."

ONE RESTAURANT owner who said he doesn't plan to serve a lot of non-alcoholic drinks, Dennis Page of Page's Food and Spirits in Farmington, added that "they're available if they want 'em."

"We carry a lot of drinks without alcohol," Page said. "We just don't sell a lot."

Non-alcoholic beverages usually are ordered by women, he said.

"We don't usually have any prob-lems with drinkers. I don't anticipate any this year because, hopefully, (customers) will have someone with them to drive home."

Local police are hoping not to have a problem with drunk drivers. They're expecting publicity of the heavy penalties for people arrested for driving drunk to discourage some.


