State will borrow for road work

The State Transportation Commis-sion is planning to borrow money to assure its 1987 highway program will proceed despite a shutdown in will proceed de federal funding.

A proposed borrowing plan would allow the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) to let con-tracts totaling an estimated 478 mil-lion in December and January in-stead of only \$11 million that would otherwise be available.

Projects that would continue on schedule include the second phase of the John C. Lodge Freeway recon-struction in Detroit and the final eight-mile leg of 1-898 Freeway in southern Oakland County, MDOT Di-rector James P. Pitz said.

states were put in jeopardy when Congress adjourned in October without passing the annual highway appropriations bill, totaling some \$13 killion. Michigan's share is about \$275 million.

Federal highway officials say the new Congress likely will not release the funds before May.

"Contracts could not be awarded before July, and that would wisp out most of "Scores of highway projects and thousands of jobs all across the state would be affected. Federal funding for bus and rail programs also is involved."

Michigan plans a \$337 million federally aided construction program in 1987 for state highways and for major county roads and city streets eligible for federal aid.
