points was high for OCC, followed by Gary Holt's 15, Derrick Williams with 13, Sam Smith at 12 and Greg Davis with 11.


Williams also nabbed 14 rebounds and Davis, a 6-foot-6 freshman cen-ter, grabbed 10.
