Just a little more than five minutes separated Brennan from super stardom and Cleveland from Super Bowl XXI.

But it just didn't come to pass as Denver quarterback. John Elway engineered a historical moment of his own.

The Bronces marched 98 yards for the game-tying touchdown and an eventual 23-20 overtime victory. The pulsating drive not only erased Brennan's heroics but set up delivery of the AFC

wn to Denver and the franchise's second ap-trance in a Super Bowl.

"I went from a game winner to total disappointment," said Brennan Tuesday from his Ohiome. "I didn't feel for myself, but for the team. I was just sorry we couldn't win.

"But you have to give Denver credit for going 98 yards in front of all those screaming Browns ans. Throughout the season there are a lot of emotional highs and lows. And to see (Denvert) win to vertime, it makes me know what the Jets must have felt like (Cleveland beat the New York Jets the previous week in double overtime by the same score).

"The further you get in the playoffs the more disappointed you get," Brennan said.

BRENNAN, A former prep standout at Bir-mingham Brother Rice and collegate star at Bos-ton College, called "The Catch" the biggest of his career.

"It was the biggest catch of my career — either at Boston College or in the National Football League," he said. "It happened in front of a na-tional audience and my family was there.


