Westland John Glenn may not have reached ab-

solute perfection Friday night in its exhilarating 74-70 win at Plymouth Salem, but it sure came

Listen to this: In a fast-paced, pressure-packed
game against an excellent Salem team, Glenn
committed all of als turnovers. Most teams would
be happy to make six in a quarter. The Rockets
made 18 of 20 free throws. In the final quarter,
when the intensity was at a peak, Glenn caimly
scored in 11 of 15 possessions. After missing their
first four shots of the final quarter, the Rockets
drained seven of the next eight. Not to mention
seven of nine free throws.

AND THE ROCKS, much to the delight of the near-capacity crowd at Salem, were just about as

Salem, thanks to a thunderous block and three points by Hale, tled the game at 38 early in the third quarter. Glenn, though, countered with a 15-10 spurt to take a 53-48 lead into the final eight minutes.

Salem coach Bob Brodie said the second and third quarters were stail to his team. "I thought we played real well early. We did exactly what we wanted to do. We pounded the ball inside," he said. "Then we seemed to have a lapse in the middle quarters and we kicked back in late in the game.

Salem began the fourth quarter with a basket by Dave Collins and a three-point play by Kearis. Tie game, 53-53. Salem went up by a point on Taylor's three-point play with 5:50 left: Glein, behind two straight boops by Hawley, went ahead 50-58. Kearis scored two straight to make it 63-62. Then Bates scored four straight in points to make it 67-62 - at last, a lead the Rocks could not crase. Glein's seven free throws in the final 2:14 kept the Rocks at bay.

Kearis scored 11 points in the quarter, Taylor seven. Bates acored eight and Hawley seven for Glein.
