Farmington's Downtown Development Authority has received seed money of \$50,000 allowing immediate downtown improvements to begin.

The loan transfer was approved Jan. 19 by the Farmington City Council as part of a seven-year \$450,000 loan arrangement between the DDA and the city.

The loan was arranged because the sale of city bonds remains in limbo due to pending litigation and

legislation involving other areas in the state, according to city mana-ger Robert Deadman.

The first loan installment will be used to pay engineering and archi-tectural costs, to prepare and di-tribute construction bids and to pay

tribute construction bids and to pay start-up planning fees. The DDA will not begin collect-ing money from an approved tax increment financing plan until July; the loan gives the DDA mon-ey to begin the project immediate-
