It was a nice way of saying no.
Farmington Hills City Council
members told Frank Manley —
president of Midleal Awareness
Foundation that manufactures medical data cards — to look elsewbere
for help in marketing his product.
"The consensus of the council is
that we all like the idea, but there

are some glitches . . . "Mayor Ben Marks sald.
Manley asked the city council to help provide his product — emer-gency medical ands — to resident senior citizens free. The cards con-tain complete medical history and a signed authorization for emergency treatment, including surgery.

But to provide senior clittens with the cards bearing the city's name and logo at no charge, Farmington fillis officials would have to author-ize spending public money to cover the card's manufacturing and pro-cessing expenses. Manley told the council he would "forgo the maket-ing profits on the card..."

The city's maximum cost, providing 5,000 senior citizens want the cards, would be \$11,750. Manley said.
"I don't know whether that would be a proper expenditure of public funds," city attorney Paul Bibeau said.
