"He's pretty shy when it comes to talking about himself," said Jim O'Leary, Scizer's football coach the past three seasons at North Farmington. "He just works hard and lets things happen. He doesn't breg, He thinks that if he talks too much people will think he's arrogant."


"They don't really tell you any-
