Bartell moved to Troy in 1978 from Cleveland where she taught French and history at the secondary level. Her first two books take advantage of her background in both fields. They are set in the period of the Norman Conquest of England in 1066 by William the Conqueror.

Bartell, mother of a 6-year-old daughter, is a graduate of Cleveland State University with a bachelor's of arts degree in French and a minor in history.
