## Pioneer families honored at ball

American Scandinavian Foundation, Detroit Associates, will host its annual ball Saturday, Feb. 21, in Botsford Inn. In keeping with the sesquicentennial theme for this year, ASF will honor descendants of Scandinavian pioneers of Michigan.

Among the early Scandinavians arriving in Michigan were the Norwegians and Finns who were recruited from Scandinavia by the copper mining industry during the American Civil War. As the first

boat loads of these northern Europeans disembarked in Hancock, they were met by Union Army recruiters who urged them to join their ranks with the promise of land grants in fertile Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska, after they had fulfilled their military obligations.

Some of the newcomers signed on and survivors later helped open the prairie lands of the midwest. Thousands more arrived during several decades to work in copper and iron

mines of Michigan. Many of the immigrants found that the heavy, low-paying and dangerous underground mining operations offered little opportunity for advancement and large numbers became involved in logging the northern forests, then turned to farming the cut-over lands and to fishing the waters of the lakes.

Many Swedes, Danes and Finns settled in the western part of the southern peninsula in farming areas near Tustin, Greenville and Kaleva.

The descendants of these early Scandinavians are scattered throughout Michigan. The local committee members have searched and traced early immigrant families. Local ASF president, Arthur J. Rudinger, Consul for Iceland in Michigan, expects a large turnout from the Scandinavian community on the occasion in honor of the pioneer families.

## Barbecue recipes called for contest

The best barbecue recipes in the land will be determined at the 1987 National Beef Cook-Off in Sun Valley, Idaho, when contestants representing all 50 states compete in the all-new "Barbecue Category" of the National Beef Cook-Off.

The Barbecue Category, like the Cook-Off's regular indoor contest, is open to anyone 18 years or older who has a non-professional food status. Deadline for entry is April 1, 1987.

All recipes must contain a minimum of one pound, and no more than

five pounds of beef. Each serving must contain at least three ounces of cooked beef. Meat used must be exclusively beef and all barbecue recipes are required to be cooked over Kingsford Charcoal on Weber Grills.

The recipe must be specific, with no use of brand names, and must state the number of servings, cooking time and approximate preparation time. The combined cooking and preparation time is not to exceed four hours.

Contestants should send their best

beef barbecue recipe utilizing any cut of beef, except organ meats, to Barbecue Category, National Beef Cook-Off, 444 N. Michigan Ave., Chicago, Ill. 60611. Each recipe should include a name, address, phone number and a brief statement about the recipe's origin.

Winners of seven regional contests

nationwide will prepare their recipes at the National Beef Cook-Off, Sept. 20-22, in Sun Valley where they will compete for the prize money.

Judging criteria for the Barbecue Category will be based on taste, ease of preparation and practicality, originality and appearance.

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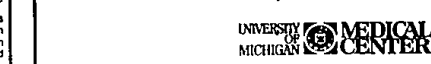
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### Sun-Damaged And Dry Skin Program
