Oakland traffic toll dips in '86

Traffic deaths fell 20 percent in Oakland County last year, and Bruce Madsen thinks he knows two reasons

First reason is more safety belt use. Second reason is less drunk driving, said Madsen, managing director of the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County.

"THE COUNTY'S relatively low fatality record last year is particularly remarkable when we consider the substantial increase in traffic volumes today compared to 20 years ago." Madsen said.

In the late 1960s, traffic deaths hit the 200 mark. Since then, traffic volumes have increased 85 percent. "If fatalities had kept pace with miles traveled, we would have reported nearly 300 people killed in traffic in Oakland drivers and their front seat passengers buckle their safety belts. Statewide, the rate is only 47 per-

cent.
Alcobol was a factor in 46 percent of the fatalities, compared to 57 percent prior to the county's drunk driving program begun in 1980, Madsen said, adding, "Our reduction in alcohol-related fatalities is among the highest in the state."
