Father of 7 Dies In Auto Crash

FARMINGTON A traffic accident that killed one motorist and injured the driver of a second car Oct. 19 is remembered.

OFFICERS SAID Clyde Harold Page, 59, of 2838 Farmington Road, Farmington Township, ran a stop sign posted on 14 Mile at Orchard Lake Road and was hit broadside by another car.

Page is number 12 on the list of township traffic fatalities for 1970. Paul E. Rado, of 25350 Orchard Farmington Township, 17-year-old driver of the second car, told police he was heading south on Orchard Lake Road about 9:25 p.m. that night when Page's car came through the intersection. Rado said he was unable to swerve in time to avoid hitting Page.

POLICE SAID there was no evidence of speeding or drinking at the scene and made no charges against Rado who was not seriously injured. Funeral services for Page were held Thursday in Healey-Sundquist Funeral Home, Farmington, and in St. Fabian Roman Catholic Church in Farmington Township. The Rev. Msgr. Charles Malloy officiated.

Burial was at St. Frances Cemetery in Alverno, near Cheboygan. Survivors of the victim: wife Lillian; children Paul F., Richard A., Leonard R., William R., Raymond J., Margaret L., and Patricia Popkey; brothers and sisters Alton, Lyle, Ida Manning; Lillian Chimner, Margaret Golden, and Jean Vroman; mother, Mrs. Nettie Page; and seven grandchildren.
