Two Detroit men face murder and conspiracy charges in the fatal shooling of a 61-year-old chauffeur at the exclusive Hunters Ridge Apartments in Farmington Hills Saturday morning



Livonia youth found guilty in Hills shooting

Livonia resident Paul Dober was found guilty Tuesday of felony charges resulting from the shooting of a black security guard at the Putt 'N' Games arcade in Farmington

"His (Dober's)
prejudice towards
black was known by
the evidence." according to a written decision rendered Tuesday by
Oakland County
Circuit Judge
James Thorburn,
who presided at
the bench trial. "It is the opinion of
the court that the respondent is
guilty as charged."
Dober, who is white, was 17 years
old and a senior at Livonia Stevenson High School on Sept. 3, 1985,
when security guard Terrence Metzier of Detroit was shot with a rifle
with the security guard the fought with on a previous night and attempted to kill
him.
Dober was convicted of assault

Dober was convicted of assault with intent to commit murder and possessing a firearm in the commission of a felony in connection with the Putt 'N' Games incident. His sentencing is scheduled for Thursday, March 12, in Thorburn's courtroom.

A \$50,000 cash or surety bond was

set by Thorburn pending sentencing, according to Oakland County Assistant Prosecutor John Skrymski. Dober was being held in a cell at the Oakland County Jail Tuesday afternoon, according to a jail spokesman. Dober faces up to life in prison for the canviction.

Defense attorney Robert Harrison did not return phone calls to comment on Thorburn's decision. It is not known whether he will appeal on Dober's behalf.
