A dowell inserted about an inch bo-low each feeder hole makes a line perch for the bird. Other feeding station ideas are a platform secured to a fence post, a tray placed on a table, even a win-dow sill with a level idege. As you decide where to place the feeder, keep in mind not to place it close to an area where cas can hide and in-terrupt the feeding.

YOU CAN make or purchase a feeding station for the birds, but you can improvise by spreading the peanut butter or suct directly on a tree that has rough bark (the birds will need a to-hold), or spreading ei-ther of these foods on a pine cone that can be wedged or hung from a branch of a nearby tree. Many of us enjoying our home base, are interested in feeding the birds. It is never too late to extend this hospitality. Be sure to have a permanent cen-tral location because birds will get accustomed to the same restaurant. To begin this program be sure to plan to be at your home for an ex-tended period of time. The food should be in constant supply so the birds are fed regularly to maintain their body heat during cold weather. There are two factors to coasider in locating a feder. It should have easy access for illing and be within MANY BIRDS like peanut butter and it provides some salt, which is necessary for their good health. To guard against plain peanut butter
