A tree planting ceremony is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. March 31 in the Wildlife Management Demonstration Area, honoring Michigan Sesqui-centennial and the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States of America.

State Awards Day is held each year to recognize the work accomplished by the 18 chapters and to honor the DAR Good Citizens.
