If you are married filling jointly and earn less than \$40,000, your IRA contribution is fully deductible. If you make \$40,000-#50,000, it is partially deductible. If you make more than \$50,000, your contribution is not

Clearly, I you are aniger/married and have an income of more than \$35,000/\$50,000 you are not allowed to deduct your IRA contributions from your taxable income.

If your adjusted gross income is \$25,000-\$35,000 (signos) for you adjusted gross income is a foint return), you still get some deduction, but you lose, \$1 worth of deduction for every extra \$5 you earn. For instance, a single taxpayer with \$37,510 in adjusted gross income is entitled to a \$680 (\$676 counded off to \$680) deduction. If be contributes \$2,000, the remaining \$1,320 will not be deductible.

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


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
