Camp serves young diabetics

Applications are available for the American Diabetes Association affiliate's 1987 summer youth camp program. Camp Midicha offers the state's children and teens with diabetes a chance to combine recreational activities with informal sessions on diabetes care.

The program, aimed at children 6-16-years-old, offers swimming, boating, hiking, games and crafts in addition to medical information. The annual camp is held at two sites. The first four sessions are in the ADA's lower peninsula campus in Lapeer County near Columbiaville. The last session takes place in August in the upper peninsula at Bay Cliff on the shores of Lake Superior, 30 miles northwest of Marquette. At both sites, campers live in cabins with their counselors and 10 other youths of the same age.

Each of the five sessions varies in length and cost:

- Session I, June 28 to July 4; 6-10-year-olds; \$175.
- Session II, July 5-18; 10-14-year-olds; \$350.
- Session III, July 19-25; 8-12-years; \$175.
- Session IV, July 26 to Aug. 8; 12-16; \$350.
- Session V, Aug. 13-22; 8-16; \$300.

While fees vary, children won't be turned away for financial reasons. Camperships and fee reductions are available.

Camp Midicha is fully accredited by the American Camping Association. Trained counselors and medical staff oversee each session. For more information about the camps and the ADA, call the Michigan affiliate at 552-0480.

Staff says thanks to teen volunteers

Denise Mannisto, an 11th grader at North Farmington High School, was among the honorees when Huron Valley Hospital staff hosted a reception for their teenage volunteers.

"If Huron Valley Hospital is any kind of indication, an increasing number of teenagers are responding to the needs of others in the community," said Anne Allen, the hospital's community relations director, speaking of the 23 teens who received pins and certificates of appreciation at the reception.

"An important purpose of the teen volunteer program is simply to give students opportunities to explore areas of interest," said Mary Pulick, the hospital's volunteer coordinator. "It may be that they are interested

in a health care career and want to see what it's like, or it may be that they are just curious."

Mannisto heard about the volunteer program from her mother who is employed with an ambulance firm. She felt some leaning towards a possible health care career and took the volunteer job to get an inside perspective.

She now works on the pediatrics floor where she assists with meals and helps make the patients' stay more comfortable.

"I think we're all very anxious at first because we're not really sure what to expect," she said. "But the staff never seem to mind answering our questions. And we can ask a lot because most often we're learning as we're doing."
