Babysitting services are available at all times and the resort's requirements for sitters include a minimum age of 16, references and screening by a supervisor. Sitters are further evaluated by the guests.

Live entertainment, nine restaurants and lounges, and a new gallery of retail shops can all be found at the resort.

Other area resorts such as Sugar Loaf in

Other area resorts such as Sugar Loaf in Leclanau County and Shanty Creek-Schuss Mountain in Antrium, noted for their excellent skling in the winter, offer tennis, golf, swimming and other family pastimes for the spring and summer months.

Ranch Rudolf, located in the Spider Lakes area south of Traverse City, and surrounded by state forest land, is a "sort of dude ranch," according to its spokespeople. With bunkhouse, motel units, and camping available, a family can have its choice of lodging. Familles take advantage of the ranch's horseriding, canoeling, and innertubing on the Boardman River; innertubing on the Boardman River; swimming in the outdoor pool, or fishing in swimming in the outdoor pool, or issing in the trout pond. Tennis and volleyball courts are also on the premises. Until Memorial Day, horseback riding and canocing are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends. The third week in May the ranch is the site of the Onion Run, a 4-wheel drive, all-terrain trail drive. The restaurant and bar is the site for live entertainment on weakends. entertainment on weekends.

Camping is the choice for many vaca-tioning families, and the area is full of state parks and private parks for campers.

Jellystone Park, located seven miles from Traverse City, is geared towards family camping with 221 sites for tents and campers.

Two full-time recreation directors organize daily activities for all age groups, including dances, movies, bingo and other games. A heated pool and playground fa-cilities are also available.

Hotels and motels along the West and Bast Bays offer sandy beaches for sun-bathing and sand play, swimming pools and playgrounds, and most lodgings not directly on the water have swimming pools or are close to public beaches and parks. for are close to public beaches and parks. For example, the new Knight's Inn is right across the street from a one-block square city park and playground. The new Hampton Inn is across from the state park beach on East Bay, and the Day's Inn and Shadowland Motel are neighbors to the Civic Center with its running track, indoor pool, playground and fields.

It's clear that families will have no trouble finding lodging that suits their needs and interests when planning a stay in the Grand Traverse Area.
