● GRAHAM MARKS: RECENT WORKS

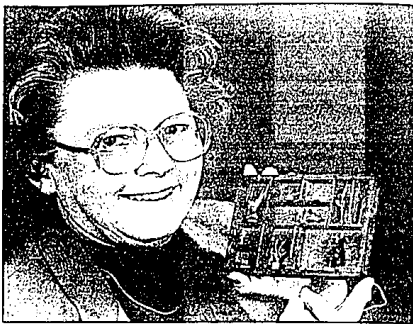
"Graham Marks: Recent Works," an important exhibition of six major ceramic pieces, is now on display at Cranbrook Academy of Art Museum through April 6.
