## Tots learn what to expect when the baby arrives

"It's My Baby, Too!" is a program created by Health Development Network of Boisdale General Hospital to teach first-time siblings how to deal with the new baby and what to expect from family changes.

Structured for children 2-6 years old, classes address such subjects as

activities to share with the new baby, what infants can and can't do, and the benefits of being an older brother or sister.

A variety of methods are used to encourage the child to learn what they can do to help mom and dad and how to express their feelings.

For example, dolls are used to teach children how to diaper and hold the baby; videotapes and puppets show children how to deal with their feelings; and a tour of the nursery and the mother's temporary residence after the birth case anxiety.

Saturday classes allow both par-

ents to attend and participate in the program. Parents are encouraged to prepare their children by discussing and addressing any anxiety or jealousy that their children are feeling.

The worst thing parents can do, according to Dr. Sandra Lynest of Midwestern Educational Resources Center, "is ignore the child's expressions and make them think the situation is not threatening. It is a totally new experience, one in which they are, for the first time, going to have to compete for attention."

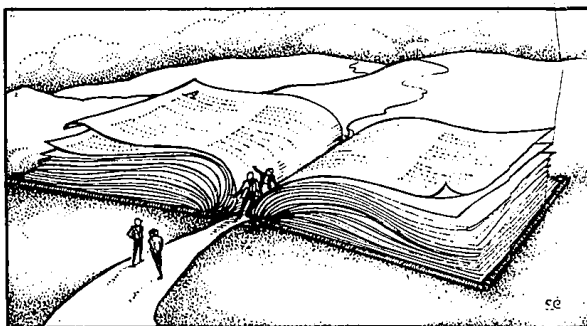
