Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police and fire calls received during the past week.

HOUSE FIRES

Damage was estimated at \$40,000 — \$10,000 to contents — when a fire broke out in the basement of a house on Fox Grove early April 2 and filled the two-story dwelling with smoke. The fire was caused by a gas leak. Flame damage was limited to the basement and upstairs living room. The cause continues to be investigated, according to a Farmington Hills Fire Department report.

TWO ARRESTED

Two teenagers face felony charges in connection with confirmed thefts of items from two cars in Farmington Hills, police said.

Arrested March 31 before Magis-

trate Dennis Phenev of Farmington, the two — a 19-year-old from Southfield and an 18-year-old from Farmington Hills — stood mute to two counts of breaking and entering of a vehicle with intent to steal property over \$5. Innocent pleas were entered in their behalf. Conviction of the felony charge could bring a penalty of up to five years in prison.

Bond was set at \$2,500 for the 18-year-old and \$1,000 for the 19-year-old pending a preliminary examination in 47th District Court.

Special Patrol Operational Team officers arrested the two at 1:30 a.m. March 31 shortly after the theft of money, binoculars, a camera and other items were confirmed stolen from two cars — one at Kendallwood Apartments and one at Cordoba Apartments about 12:30 a.m., said detective Brian DeGrande of the Farmington Hills Police Department.

ILLEGAL FIREWORKS

A 19-year-old Farmington resident was ticketed for having no permit to display or discharge fireworks in connection with the firing of bottle rockets April 2.

Bottle rockets, missile rockets and firecrackers were confiscated from a house on Twin Valley in connection with the incident, according to a Farmington Department of Public Safety report.
