## WSU to house Rouge archives

Wayne State University is now rt of the Rouge River cleanup

Wayne State University is now part of the Rouge River cleanup team.
With an \$80,000 grant from the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG), WSU will set aside a portion of its Science and Enjenering, Library to house existing and future reports and documents about the Rouge River.
"This information will provide a single resource of all of the history of efforts and all the data on the Rouge River to help on that process," said Ralph Kummler, chair of the chemical and metallargical engineering department at WSU.

THE ROUGE River Archive will supply the centralized store of infor-mation necessary for cleanup ef-forts. Kummler and Thomas M. Heidtke, associate professor of civil

engineering, will head the project at Wayne State.
"The Natural Resource Commission and the Water Resources Commission and the Water Resources Commission, with the support of Gov. James J. Blanchard, have made a big commitment to clean up the Rouge River by the year 2005," Kummler sald.

The Selence and Engineering Library on the main campus in Detroit will house the archive in perpetuity at no cost, Kummler added.
The collection will be available to the public on a reference basis during library hours, presently more than 90 hours a week. The material will be catalogued using standard rules which allow entry of descriptive records into machine-readable databases and will be accessible via the WSU online catalog, an easy-to-use computer system.
