Michigan consumers will pay higher prices for beer and soft drinks if changes are made in the state's nine-year-old beverage con-tainer law, according to a study by Dr. Marilyn Nagy, an Eastern Michi-gan University associate professor of family and consumer economics.

Nor does it describe a method for collecting this revenue.

Michigan consumers already pay

substantially higher prices for beer and soft drinks than residents of neighboring states such as Illinois, where beverage containers are not redeemed for 5-cent and 10-cent de-posits as they are in Michigan, Nagy said.

DURING THE third week of January, Nagy found, Michigan consumers paid from 20 percent to 30 percent more than Illinois residents for beer, and from 7 percent to 26 percent more for soft drinks.

"If wholesalers and bottlers are expected to divert some bottle de-

posit revenue to environmental causes, they will necessarily up their price to retailers, who, in turn, will increase their prices, so the real loser would be the consumer," Nagy said.

She said a 1986 report on the bot-tle deposit law by a Lansing consult-ing firm contained misleading infor-mation. According to Nagy, the firm's report was based on question-able assumptions regarding cost and cost recovery.

"That report overestimated in-come from recycling and underes-

timated the costs of recycling."
Nagy said.
