The sponsor forms for those wanting to join Farmington and Farmington Hills' second annual CROP: Walk Against Hunger can be picked up now in Orchard United Methodist Church office, 30450 Farmington Road.

The church is one of about 20 area churches and service groups who were represented in the CROP Walk rally, sponsored by Our Lady of Sorrows Church early this month, to spell out the goals of the walk and promote the fund-raiser here.

Similar walks take place around the country to raise money for hunger relief, both here and abroad, distributed through Church World Service. The walk staged last spring here was sponsored by Farmington Area Clergy.

This year several service organizations, Farmington Hills Salvation Army, Farmington Area Head Start, and Mercy High School students, have joined in the effort by asking

their families, neighbors and friends to pledge any amount for number of kilometers walked.

The walk begins this year at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 17, at First United Methodist Church of Farmington in downtown Farmington. Walkers will follow a 10 kilometer route and return to the church.

"The goal is to raise \$22,000 — double of what we raised last year," said Judy Houser, who is coordinating this year's walk. "We think we can do it because we got an early start, much earlier than last year. It all depends on getting sponsors."

Houser said she would mail out the sponsor forms, or ever deliver them herself. "I'll mail the sponsor forms or even hand deliver them myself, whatever it takes to get them filled up with pledges," she said.
