

ARTS AND SPLASH — Southfield offers plenty of opportunities for the dedicated cheap dater.

For instance, there are free con-certs on a rotating basis every Sun-day morning at Southfield Civic Cen-ter, Prudential Towne Center, Tel-12 Mall and Northland. There is a free art festival June 5-7 at Prudential Towne Center.
