Mrs. Sara Evans, the bridegroom's sister, wore a celer-

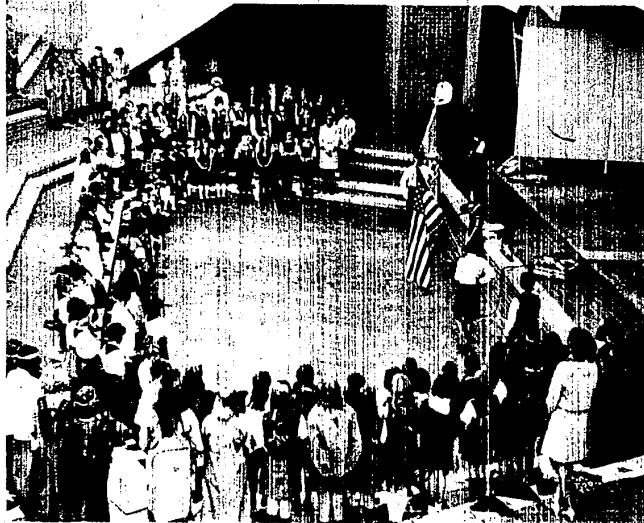
