

# Harrison maintains mastery of Chiefs

Farmington Harrison struck again Monday when the Hawks knocked off division-leading Plymouth Canton 10-6 in Western Lakes Activities Association baseball.
Harrison, which took a 1-0 victory from the Chiefs earlier in the season, improved to 4-3 in the Western Division of the WLAA. Canton slipped to 5-2 in the division and 9-4 overall. Sam Rineer's bases-loaded, threerun double proved to be the Hawks' game-winning hit, putting Harrison on top 8-2 in the fourth inning. 
